BCMH Rehab Department Keeps Herman Strauch Going and Going...

At 84 years old, Herman Strauch easily might be compared to the Energizer Bunny—he just keeps going and going!

B ut he's also quick to let you in on the secret to how he does it. "The Rehabilitation Services Department at Bates County Memorial Hospital has helped me remain in my home and independent," he says. "I'm still going strong thanks to them!"

In fact, Herman has a long-standing relationship with the department and its staff dating back 24 years. That's when his left leg was amputated below the hip due to cancer. "I did most of my rehabilitation right here in Butler after that," Herman says. "They taught me how to walk again using two forearm crutches and helped me become mobile. I like to say they got me back on my 'foot' again!'" he laughs.

Between his crutches and a power wheelchair, Herman was very active until his right knee began bothering him a couple of years ago. "I had my right knee replaced, then did my physical therapy here at the hospital after a brief stay at a nursing facility," Herman explains. "Because I only have one leg, it's important that it works well and that I remain strong."

Because he recognizes how important it is to be active, Herman pays a low monthly fee to use the Rehabilitation Department's equipment. "If I didn't do this, I wouldn't get the exercise I need," he admits. "They have a couple of machines I like to work out on to keep my upper body and my leg strong. It's well worth it. Plus, everyone here knows me and they are very encouraging. They won't let me quit."

Herman needed their encouragement, skills and knowledge again recently when he crushed the thumb on his right hand. "I was moving a couple of big rocks and my thumb got caught between them. I really did some damage to it."

After surgery to stabilize his thumb, Herman knew more rehabilitation was in his future, this time with the hospital's occupational therapist who specializes in hand therapy.

"I have to have the use of my hands," Herman says. "To walk with my crutches, I have to be able to grip them, and put all of my weight on my palms. I couldn't do that after surgery. I went to therapy three times a week for a couple of months to regain the strength in that hand so I could use my crutches again. Without them, I would be trapped in my home."

Today, Herman is back to his daily routine and on the move. "I can do everything now that I did before," he says. "I go to the store and load and unload my groceries myself, and go to the high school football games. I am very independent.

"I can't praise the staff at the Bates County Memorial Hospital Rehabilitation Department enough," Herman adds. "Their skills, knowledge and how they relate to their patients is excellent. I have had therapy in a couple of other places over the years, but no one compares to what we have here. I call them my PT Department, and I recommend them highly!"

BCMH Clinic Relieves Pain for Area Resident

Sixty-eight-year-old Jerry Wood lives with pain every day—pain from scoliosis, pain from fibromyalgia and pain from arthritis. On good days, he rates his pain a two to four on a scale of one to 10, but on bad days, it's a 10.

"
y pain varies in intensity, but I know when it consistently reaches a six to seven, everyday tasks like taking out the trash or going for a brief walk are no longer possible, and it's time to do something about it," Jerry says. That's when he schedules an appointment with the Bates County Memorial Hospital (BCMH) Pain Management Clinic for a steroid epidural injection.

"I've been seeing Dr. Hamilton for three or four years now," Jerry says. "The injections I receive help relieve the pain in my lower back and neck for several months. I usually need two to three injections a year."

Like many people, Jerry has suffered with back pain much of his life, but he's never had back surgery. "I used to go to Kansas City for my injections, but I'm glad the hospital offers them here. It's only 20 miles from my home in Appleton City, so it's much more convenient for me, and I am very pleased with the staff in the Outpatient Clinic. I have nothing but good things to say about them!"

About the BCMH Pain Management Clinic

According to a web-based survey of patients in the United States and published by the American Pain Society, as much as 30 percent of the population suffers from chronic pain lasting six months or longer, like Jerry. Lower back pain and chronic osteoarthritis pain are the most common painful conditions.

The two physicians providing pain management services are Dennison R. Hamilton, M.D., and Roger Misasi, D.O. Both doctors see patients in the BCMH Outpatient Clinic. They specialize in treating:

- Back and neck pain
- Joint pain, including hand, wrist, elbow and shoulder pain
- Knee pain and injury
- Foot, ankle and hip pain
- Disc bulges, protrusions and extrusions
- Back and neck pain that has failed to respond to surgery

BCMH offers a variety of therapies to aid in the management of pain performed under X-ray guidance. These include:

- Steroid epidural injections
- Nerve blocks
- Joint injections
- Trigger point injections

Minimally invasive surgical procedures typically performed on an outpatient basis to relieve acute, chronic or cancer-related pain conditions include:

- Kyphoplasty
- Radiofrequency ablation
- Spinal cord stimulator implantation

Digital Mammography Available at BCMH

According to the Missouri Department of Health, breast cancer accounts for one-third of all cancers diagnosed in the state, and is the leading cause of cancer deaths in women after lung cancer.

o effectively detect breast cancer as early as possible, Bates County Memorial Hospital (BCMH) uses digital mammography. A digital mammogram uses X-rays to generate images of the breast. However, instead of using film to capture and record the image, a digital mammogram uses a special detector to capture and convert X-ray energy into dig



special detector to capture and convert X-ray energy into digital data. This technology allows the radiologist to view the images on a highresolution computer monitor that helps them better see the structures within the breast tissue. The radiologist also can adjust brightness and contrast, and zoom in on specific areas to help detect small breast tissue changes that may be signs of early cancer.

BCMH also uses a Computer-Aided Detection (CAD) system for the early detection of breast cancer. In mammography, CAD highlights tiny calcification clusters and extremely dense structures in soft breast tissue. This technology helps the radiologist to diagnose breast cancer accurately.

Digital mammography significantly reduces the time patients spend at their mammography appointments, as well as the need for repeat examinations and additional views.

Mammograms Save Lives

The cure rate for breast cancer is 97 percent, when detected early. If you have no signs or symptoms of breast abnormalities, you should schedule a screening mammogram according to the American Cancer Society's recommendations:

- Women 40 years of age and older should have routine mammograms every year. Women who are at a high risk for being diagnosed with breast cancer should talk with their health care providers.
- If you experience any changes in your breasts, contact your primary health care provider as soon as possible for an evaluation. These changes include:
 - Development of a lump
 - Swelling
 - Skin irritation
 - Nipple pain
 - Nipple retraction
 - Redness or cracking of the nipple or breast skin
 - Any discharge other than milk, especially if spontaneous

No Excuses! 30 Sho Get a Shot!

Every year, according to the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), as many as 20,000 people die from the flu, and another 18,000 adults 65 years or older die from pneumonia. Thousands more end up hospitalized, but vaccinations can prevent both the flu and pneumonia.

What You Can Do About the Flu...

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With few exceptions, the CDC recommends everyone get a flu vaccine. If possible, try to get the flu vaccine before the holidays. This allows time for the body to produce antibodies to protect against the flu, before the season typically hits in the Midwest.

Protection lasts several months to a year. Still, you need to get a flu vaccine each year because the influenza virus is constantly changing. The vaccination that protected you last season may not help this year.

The flu vaccine cannot cause the flu because it uses inactivated virus. Still, some people do experience soreness at the spot where the shot is given. This usually lasts a day or less. Some people also may have a low-grade fever, muscle pain or feelings of discomfort or weakness. In addition to the shot, an inhaled vaccine also is available.

You May Need a Pneumonia Vaccination

The CDC recommends two pneumococcal vaccines for all adults 65 years or older and adults 19 years old or older with certain health conditions, or those taking medications that may lower the body's resistance to infection.

Discuss which pneumonia vaccination is right for you, and when you need the vaccination with your health care provider.

Most private health insurance plans cover pneumonia and flu vaccines. Check with your insurance provider for details on whether there is any cost to you. Medicare Part B also covers 100 percent of the cost for the pneumococcal vaccine.
